## Magic wands and potions

- Bring a jar of water with you on your walk.
- Find a good stick to be your magical stirring stick.
- Look out for brightly coloured leaves, shiny berries, fluffy feather and any other treasures to add to your potion. Use your torch to help you find them!
- Add everything to the jar and use your stick to stir it.
- Find a special place to make a wish and pour out your potion to set the magic into action.

#### Twig skeleton

- Gather some natural materials to make a skeleton
- Twigs, pebbles, leaves, conkers, what can you find?
- Find a clear area to lay it out
- Make a skull from a large leaf, add conkers for eyes
- Use leaves to make collarbones and a pelvis.
- Twigs are perfect for legs, arms, ribcage and spine
- Twigs or catkins work for fingers and toes
- Try conkers for kneecaps and elbows

For a daytime adventure, older girls can use their tracking skills to leave a track for other family members to follow. Here are some easy signs:





#### Crafts

#### **Egg carton bats**

Materials: Egg carton, scissors, colours, string

Optional: Glue, googly eyes

Separate 3 cups from an egg carton

 Cut out part of the bottoms of the two outside cups to resemble bat wings

Add eyes and decorate

• Make a hole in the top to hang it from a string



#### **Toilet Roll Mummies**

**Materials:** Empty toilet roll tube, toilet paper, glue, marker/googly eyes

- Draw (or stick on) some eyes onto your tube
- Tear bits of paper (toilet paper, or normal) into strips and stick them around the tube
- Leave just they eyes peeking out



#### **Paper Plate Ghosts**

Materials: Paper plates, white paper, markers, scissors, glue

- Draw eyes and mouth on the plate, make them as friendly or as scary as you like
- Cut white paper into strips (you could also use tissue paper, or white plastic bags)
- Stick strips to hang down behind the plate
- Use one strip to make a loop for hanging





#### **Monster Rocks**

Materials: Stones, paint, paintbrushes

#### **Origami Ghost**



Materials: Squares of white paper, black marker

Optional: Sticky tape, string

- 1. Fold your paper in half along one of the diagonals to make a triangle shape. Unfold.
- 2. Fold the left and right sides of the triangle into the middle line
- 3. Fold the left and right corners back
- 4. Flip your paper over.
- 5. Fold the flaps of the triangles you made in the last step, so they lay flat against the sides of your ghost
- 6. Fold the left and right corners of the paper into the middle.
- 7. Make the Ghost's Head by folding the top triangle down slightly.
- 8. Make an accordion fold where the ghost's neck would be.
- 9. Flip your paper over once more. Fold the bottom point over as demonstrated in the photo above.
- 10. Use a black marker to draw eyes and a mouth on your ghost.













#### **Strawberry Ghosts**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 16oz White Cooking Chocolate
- 24 Fresh Strawberries
- Mini Chocolate Chips

#### Method (strawberries):

- Melt white chocolate in a bowl over a pot of boiling water
- Place a large piece of parchment paper on a flat surface
- Dip strawberries in melted chocolate, holding them by the leaves
- Remove from chocolate and hold them over the parchment paper
- Allow a little chocolate to drip to form the "tail" of the ghost
- Slide the strawberry back and leave to set
- Add mini chocolate chips for eyes and mouth before it sets

#### **Banana Ghosts**

Similar method to above but using bananas. Also works with just chocolate chips.

## **Candy Apples** (from Supervalu.ie)

#### **Ingredients:**

- 4 apples
- ½ tsp cream of tartar
- 3 tsp food colouring
- 550g sugar
- 225ml water
- Sprinkles

#### Method:

- Place the sugar, water, and cream of tartar into a heavy based saucepan.
- Dissolve slowly then bring to the boil for approximately 5 minutes without allowing it to colour, keep the mixture transparent.
- To test the temperature is correct, dip a spoon into the caramel and remove onto parchment paper, it should set immediately, otherwise allow to cook for a further minute or two or when you are happy with the consistency.
- Add the food colouring and you are ready to coat the apples.
- Skewer the apples and tilt the pan of caramel to one side and swirl the apple through the caramel, covering the two thirds of the apple.
- Lift and allow excess to drain and place on the parchment lined baking tray.
- Add your favourite sprinkles for extra colour



#### **Eerie Eyeball Cakepops**

#### **Ingredients:**

- 100g/4oz madeira cake
- 100g Oreo cookie
- 100g bar milk chocolate melted
- 200g bar white chocolate melted
- Smarties and icing pens

#### You will also need:

• Wooden skewers, ½ small pumpkin deseeded, to stand pops in

#### Method

- 1. Break the Madeira cake and cookies into the bowl of a food processor, pour in the melted milk chocolate and whizz to combine.
- 2. Tip the mixture into a bowl, then use your hands to roll into about 10 walnut-sized balls. Chill for 2 hrs until really firm.
- 3. Push a skewer into each ball, then carefully spoon the white chocolate over the cake balls to completely cover.
- 4. Stand the cake pops in the pumpkin, then press a Smartie onto the surface while wet.
- 5. Chill again until the chocolate has set.
- 6. Before serving, using the icing pens, add a pupil to each Smartie and wiggly red veins to the eyeballs.

#### **Snot-tail**

#### **Ingredients**

- 135g pack lime jelly
- 700ml apple juice
- 300ml lemonade

#### Method:

- Make the jelly following pack instructions and chill until set
- Combine the apple juice with the lemonade and chill in the fridge
- When the jelly has set, use a whisk to break it up into small chunks
- Spoon into the cocktail glasses and top up with the apple juice mixture



# Pin the tail on the black cat / Pin the wart on the witch

- Played like Pin the Tail on the Donkey.
- Girls can use their neckerchiefs as blindfolds.
- To make it even harder, spin around 3 times before starting!

#### **Pumpkin & Broom Race**

- Use one pumpkin and broom for each team.
- This is a simple race but since pumpkins are not smooth balls and refuse to roll in straight lines, you'll need plenty of room!

#### **Musical Zombies**

Played like musical statues. The girls walk around the room like zombies to the music and freeze when the music stops.

# **Halloween Bowling**

- Draw faces on rolls of toilet paper and stack them up ready for bowling.
- Use ordinary tennis balls, or mini pumpkins
- See who can knock down the most ghosts in one turn.
