What is IGG?

Irish Girl Guides (IGG) is a youth-driven, uniformed, dynamic organisation offering a varied and exciting programme for girls and young women aged 5-30, and opportunities for women of all ages.

Irish Girl Guides is a registered charity and complies with relevant legal obligations, current best practices and good governance standards.

IGG is a member of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts, a worldwide movement of over 10 million girls and women in over 150 countries. Through this global network our members develop confidence and learn about global issues and advocacy. Girl Guiding offers wonderful travel opportunities for youth members and adult Leaders both around Ireland and the wider world.



What we do

Girl Guiding encourages the best in people, giving members the opportunity to discover new ideas, develop new skills, and forge strong friendships.

Members of Irish Girl Guides follow a non-formal educational programme called the Journey Programme which enables each person to embark on a developmental journey full of fun, adventure and challenge. The Journey Programme incorporates all we do and is designed to ensure that we achieve our mission 'to enable girls and young women to develop to their fullest potential as responsible citizens of the world'.

The Journey Programme has three elements in each Branch programme: Compulsory Challenges, Choice Challenges and Interest Badges. Our members learn new skills, grow in self-confidence, develop teamwork and leadership skills, experience new activities, and build lifelong friendships.

Everyone who shares our ethos and values is welcome to have a role in supporting Irish Girl Guides and the experiences members gain and memories they make are priceless. As a girl-only movement, girls are free to develop and express themselves in a safe, comfortable, supported setting. We have a strong emphasis on the outdoors, environment, community responsibility and global sisterhood.

Who we are?

We are a youth movement of 11,000 girls and women from every county in Ireland. We have four different age brackets which we call Branches and girls of each Branch meet in local groups called Units.

A Unit is a group of approximately 20-30 girls from the one age bracket (Branch) who meet in a local community on a weekly basis. There are over 530 Units spread across Ireland. Units are run by a team of volunteer Leaders who have undertaken the relevant screening and training and there is a support network available to support the volunteer on her leadership journey.

We actively promote diversity and inclusion and welcome girls and young women from all walks of life. Anyone who lives their life as female and accepts our Guide Promise and Law is welcome to join the organisation.

How do we do it?


How we do it? The Guiding approach underpins everything we do and it is based on the Fundamental Principles which are clearly expressed in the Guide Promise and Law. The original Promise and Law was developed at the beginning of the Guide Movement's history over a hundred years ago and has evolved in keeping with the times.

Our Leaders are expected to set a high standard and act as positive role models for the girls in the way they work together as a team, the way they wear our uniform and the pride they take in being members of Irish Girl Guides. There is a specific aim that we set out to achieve at every meeting and activity and our volunteers lead with our vision and mission in mind.

A key to the success of every Unit is that the girls are involved in as many decisions as possible and play a large part in the organising of the programme appropriate to their age and abilities, but behind the scenes the success of everything that happens in the Unit largely depends on the leadership team.

Irish Girl Guides is built on an ethos of volunteering and all our members volunteer for the various roles in managing this organisation. IGG employs a small number of staff to support the volunteers at both local and national levels and both staff and volunteers are recognised for the vital role they play in ensuring we achieve our mission and our strategic plan.

Honorary Ambassador

Hockey superstar, Shirley McCay, has been an inspiration to our youth members and volunteers since her appointment as Honorary Ambassador to Irish Girl Guides in 2020. Through a very difficult year, Shirley helped show our members how important resilience and patience is, not only in these tough times but throughout life! Shirley was a former Brownie & Guide and is now a member of Ireland's international hockey team. She is also the most capped female athlete in this country having earned over 300 caps!

When she received her 300th cap, Shirley said "To every young Irish girl who dares to dream and every old Irish girl who has gone before ... this one's for you!"

There is no doubt that Shirley inspired and motivated us all during 2020/2021 and we are hugely thankful to her.

2020... What a bonkers year!

2020 was an exceptional year due to Covid-19. A core activity for IGG was supporting the volunteers through the challenges of Covid-19. This included teambuilding initiatives, social activities, and opportunities for development as volunteers. The planning for the Regional Conferences is always in place at the start of each year and this was the same in 2020, however, this required adaptation by each of the regional teams. Examples of such were the South East Regional Conference which incorporated branch training sessions, relaxation/activity sessions and motivational speakers.



One of the fundamental principles of Guiding is Outdoors and even though we couldn't do this in person, there were three separate Camp at Home events held for all members of IGG to access. These were themed events held over the course of a weekend with the programme packs sent out electronically. The first of these was held in April 2020 and was a general theme of camping, building own shelters and completing outdoor challenges within their direct area and based on government guidelines at that time. In June 2020 another event was held that had a climate action theme, with a final event in 2020 that had a Halloween theme.



There was lots of interaction on social media with lots of sharing of images of indoor and outdoor family tents and outdoor cooking! To complement these events a Camp at Home Badge was created.

Many leaders went above and beyond to show our members resilience and kindness by opting to create activity packs for their members when we were in lockdown. An example of which was these packs left in a central area for Brownies to collect to support the IGG Journey Programme.

Governance & Management of IGG in 2020


IGG is a self-governing uniformed, youth organisation led by volunteers and supported by professional staff.

IGG is bound by its Constitution and Bye-Laws. IGG has full membership of the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS) through the Council of Irish Guiding (CIGA). IGG is independent from any political organisation or any political party.

Structure of the Organisation

The General Council is responsible for the control and general supervision of IGG as per the Constitution and Bye- Laws. The Executive Committee, subject to the supervision of the General Council, controls and manages the affairs of IGG and is responsible for the overall strategic vision of the organisation. The Programme and Training Committee, subject to the supervision of the General Council, is responsible for coordinating the development and delivery of all aspects of the Guiding programme and maintaining communication between National Committees and Branches.

In 2020, the Executive Committee had the very difficult challenge of navigating IGG and its members through the unknown of Covid-19, a global pandemic that still impacts us. The Executive Committee along with all other committees of IGG changed to online meetings to ensure communication and planning could continue. The Executive Committee met 7 times, Finance 11 times and Programme and Training met 4 times. As well as this, volunteers who have responsibility at a national level met numerous other times to discuss and plan for the enormous impact of Covid-19. Executive Committee attendance averaged 90%. Eighteen members had an attendance rate of 100%. There are 17 voting members and 6 nonvoting members on the committee.



Governance & Compliance

IGG is a registered Charity and complies with all statutory obligations. IGG has always held itself to the highest standards of best practice in relation to governance and compliance to ensure transparency and accountability.

This continues as IGG seek Company Limited by Guarantee legal status. IGG currently an unincorporated association is applying to change its legal status to a CLG. There are many implications to this. The Executive and Finance committees and the staff team supporting these committees are embarking on this journey!

IGG review all policies, procedures, guidelines as part of a cyclical review to the board. This includes, Risk, Finance, Reserves, Health & Safety, Safeguarding and HR related policies. IGG complete Lobbying returns annually and are signed up to the Dochas Code of Conduct on images and messages and strives to abide by the Leave No Trace ethos.

Financial Summary

In 2020, IGG took measures to secure funding for 2021 Operational planning, this meant securing some Reserves (provisions) as a deficit was predicted in light of Covid-19, and a foreseen impact on membership income for 2021. Below is a pie chart highlighting what the membership fee in 2020 went towards and the % contributed. The membership fee is a vital part of the Organisation's several income as it totals almost 50% of the overall income. The €45 received from every member goes a long way and we thank every member who continues to support IGG.

The Finance Committee are delegated the responsibility by Excutive to manage the financial affairs of IGG and report back to the Executive Committee. IGG continue to ensure that adequate systems of internal controls are in place and work continues by a small group of staff and volunteers reviewing all procedures in place. The Finance Manual contains an explanation for all finanial procedures within the organisation. IGG continue to review and modify procedures as we develop and which we believe are in the best interests of all our members.

Each Unit, District and Area keeps a proper financial record for which they appoint a Treasurer who monitors the finances at local level. Regions and Committees keep proper financial records which are checked by the Finance Committee on an Annual Basis. An external Auditor is retained annually to report on the performance.

IGG's income is dependent on a grant from the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth which was €418,004 (42.17%), Membership income €422,203 (43.14%), Other Grants €132,384 (13.53%).

IGG greatly appreciates all the funding received in 2020. Funding from the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth, ESB Energy for Generations, NYCI - STEAM Equipment Grant, Games in Youth Work, Tesco Community Funding, ESERO Grant - CIT Blackrock Observatory, Department of Foreign Affairs, Trocaire, the Katherine Howard Foundation, Castleroy/ Keeper Dormant Account Refund, LHK/Allianz Safety Guidelines Sponsorship. We would also like to thank all individual private donors whatever the sum, we thank you.

IGG is a not for profit organisation and has been granted charitable status under the Taxes Consolidation Act 1996 (CHY4726). IGG is registered with the Charities Regulator Authority (RCN: 20006327). IGG is officially recognised as meeting the requirements of the Irish Charities Tax Reform Group (ICTR) Statement of Guiding Principles for Fundraising.

Governance -IGG properties

In 2019, after a long search, IGG bought a new property in Dublin and set about turning this blank canvas in Belgard Square, Tallaght into the Irish Girl Guides National Training Centre. Strong and pragmatic women have chartered our geographical history and have made our transitions possible.

Our new purpose-led building will meet the expanding needs of IGG and be accessible to Guides and Leaders from across Ireland, while allowing for growth into the future. When it is renovated and furnished, our new fully wheelchair accessible headquarters will include training rooms, collaboration and maker spaces, office space and our Distribution Centre. But more than that, this Centre will give Guides and Leaders from all backgrounds a holistic space to spark and develop new ideas, and equip the next generation of Irish female role models.

As well as successfully securing Capital Funding from the Department of Children and Youth Affairs and two Foundations in 2020, IGG continues to research other grant opportunities and seek corporate support. A LEGO Fundraising campaign was initiated in 2020 and this will continue into the future. Fundraising for this new state-of-the-art training centre will continue to be a large part of the organisation's focus in 2021.



THANK YOU TO YOU, OUR MEMBERS!

2020 was the start of what has become our new normal! Who knew back in January 2020, the challenges that we would face together apart for the rest of the year? You the IGG volunteers demonstrated your loyalty to the members and the organisation in many ways: activity packs developed and delivered, online meetings, check-ins via WhatsApp and in some areas, closure. No matter where you featured in this line up, thank you. We are aware that many of our leaders are frontline workers or care for family members; often schooling and parenting at home took priority as well as looking after our own health, physically, mentally, and emotionally.

This pandemic has changed us in many ways, but to everyone who is still here, and has IGG in their thoughts and a desire for us to get back to Guiding, Thank You.

Staffing Changes

Staff are normally based in National Office in Pembroke Park. In March all staff transferred to working remotely. This change in working systems allowed for some flexibility with regard to home circumstances. It did impact IGG as there was limited access to laptops, and staff were required to access personal equipment in the majority of cases. Working in a virtual environment presented many challenges and learning for all staff both National and Regional. Thanks to a Capital Grant in 2020 from DCEDIY all staff were supplied with technology to support working from home. Information storage changed during 2020 and is now stored in a cloud-based server rather than a physical server, which further facilitates remote working.

There were a number of staff changes in 2020, from the resignation of the CEO in March 2020 and the appointment of Claire Barkey as the CEO in September 2020; the resignation of the Operations Manager in July 2020 and appointment of Anne L'Henoret who took up her position at the start of 2021; and the recruitment and appointment of a new role "Financial Support Officer" to support IGG with all regional, committee and Unit level accounts. There were two Regional Development Officers appointed in March 2020 and these appointments were delayed starting due to Covid-19.

Covid-19 had an impact on the volunteer engagement, and this had an impact on the work available. Regional Staff were temporarily laid off for 8 weeks, while National Office staff were placed on short time working hours during the summer months.

The staff team in IGG have worked tirelessly in 2020 with a number of volunteers to ensure the organisation maintained its high standards and continued to provide a valuable youth service for its members throughout the year. The organisation thanks all staff that worked for Irish Girl Guides in 2020.





Impact of Covid-19 Global Pandemic

The public health restrictions due to this global pandemic have had a significant impact on the delivery of services by IGG members. Many of our members have been affected as families, employees, employers, carers, parents, youth members and Leaders. Our sympathies are with those who have lost a loved one and our thoughts and supports are with those dealing with the crisis on the frontline and at home. The impact on everyone cannot be underestimated and in true Guiding spirit we continued through difficult times with our Promise and Law as our guide.

Our volunteer Leaders have had to make decisions based on their capacity to continue to provide a service to our youth members. Some members have not been in a position to do this for many reasons. The impact of the lack of technology on Leaders and youth members is not fully known but we are definitely aware that there are issues regarding broadband availability in different parts of the country.

IGG have been monitoring the level of engagement at a local level and offering formal and informal peer support and training to get units back up and running.

Units that meet in school properties have been impacted significantly and have not been able to return to the use of these premises. Some locations have limited or no access to another venue so making it difficult to be active.

For Leaders and members who have been able to engage this has taken place in many formats based on the age profile of the youth member and the availability and capacity of the Leaders. This has been provided using various virtual platforms, messaging services, programme packs delivered or collected at a pickup point, craft packs posted, online national and regional events, Camp at Home events and LEGO camps. Outdoor meetings took place when they were allowed as did indoor meetings for a short period of time. No overnight events took place after March 2020. Camping has just been introduced in July 2021 for IGG members.

All Leaders have trained on Covid-19 as per NYCl and government guidelines, and continue to use contact tracing forms, return to guiding forms, risk assessments with guidelines to reduce the spread of Covid-19. Leaders have been inventive in maintaining pods and when online there was ongoing evaluation and exploration of what could be accessed for use using the online format and this led to new developments such as visitors speaking to the girls, online baking and cooking plus linking with members in other countries to complete joint activities.

NEW BADGES



During 2020 there was an opportunity for IGG to participate in a Youth Climate Justice project as part of a consortium led by ECO-UNESCO. 4 IGG teams with 25 participants took part and completed projects on various topics from fast fashion to a review of an area regarding facilities for recycling and dog waste disposal.



The launch of our exciting new SPACE badge was completed during Space Week in October 2020. This online launch was presented by Aisling Claffey and supported by astrophysicist and scientist Dr Kate Isaak, Rebecca Barnes from the European Space Agency, Education and Outreach Officer at CIT Blackrock Castle Observatory, Francis McCarthy and Stephanie O'Neill, Manager of ESERO Ireland, Science Foundation Ireland, along with Dr Niamh Shaw IGG Ambassador at the time. Following this launch there were 511 badges awarded to Ladybirds, Brownies, Guides and Senior Branch members.



2020 despite the restrictions was a very active year for STEAM activities in IGG. The start of 2020 saw the 2 IGG teams competing in the FIRST LEGO League. LearnIT supported the IGG teams and they travelled to complete training with the girls in Galway and Cork and a number of weekends in DCU. There was a huge time and investment from the girls (& their families). There was wonderful PR when the IGG teams won 3 awards at the National finals and won a place to represent Ireland at a European level event.

Funding was provided by the Institute of Engineering and Education and DCU School of STEM Education, Innovation and Global Studies. Travel costs were funded by IGG and the LEGO Kits donated to IGG after the event.

Unfortunately, the team were not able to travel to the European event due to Covid-19.





In October 2020 a virtual LEGO Robotics camp was held in conjunction with DCU and LearnIT. 34 girls took part in this Camp. This was the first virtual camp that DCU Education and Innovation Studio with LearnIT completed, and it was a very successful event. Packs were sent to all participants for completion as part of this camp.


This concluded with a demonstration for families and an awards ceremony for each participant.

Plans for the 2020/2021 First LEGO League started in November 2020 with 4 team spaces available for IGG. A Ladybird Unit expressed an interest in taking part in this programme.







Become a Volunteer

Guiding is an opportunity - it gives you the chance to help the next generation to learn to live and grow into adults equipped to cope with the joys, the anxieties, the fears and the demands of life. Guiding encourages the best in all of us as it gives us the opportunity to discover new ideas, new skills, new experiences and new friendships. You will find that the friendships you form with other Leaders and your relationship with the girls will enrich your life and help with your personal development. It will also provide you with important lifeskills that are transferable to other aspects of your life such as career, travel, studies, family and friendships. There is a place for everyone in IGG and there are many different roles that you can take up that suit your availability and your skill set. Some adults: volunteer at weekly meetings with our youth members and become a Leader, volunteer for a non-Unit role e.g. committee membership. administration, specific skill teaching and become Non-Unit Volunteers (NUV), join Trefoil Guild if they can't give a weekly commitment but want to stay involved, become an occasional Unit Helper with a Unit or in their local area. All our volunteers complete a screening process when they begin volunteering with us. They also receive training and must complete a number of requirements to gain a licence, called a warrant, after which there are many different opportunities available to them. Women who take on leadership roles have the opportunity to increase their organisational, youth work and outdoor knowledge, improve their skills by working in teams with other like-minded people and can gain qualifications.





Funding

As a not-for-profit, Irish Girl Guides continues to rely on both membership fees and grant funding to operate and support the Units nationwide. In 2020, the Finance Committee worked hard to diversify the funding streams and reduce any potential over-reliance on any one source. Details of the actions taken are outlined in the finance section of this report. The challenge became an opportunity as by reaching out to other organisation and corporates, a number of partnerships have developed. Our members have benefited both through training opportunities, provision of resources and funding to reduce the badge costs incurred by Units and their members. Fundraising was an area identified in 2020 for support in order to assist with the National Training Centre development. A contract was entered into with a Fundraiser for 2020. This gave us the opportunity to engage with many philanthropic and charitable organisations, thus raising the profile of IGG. Unfortunately, the fundraising plan despite much hard work was significantly impacted by Covid-19. IGG will continue to work to secure diverse and sustainable funding streams and to grow our fundraising capacity.
